Introduction to Level III – Radical for Christ! "Full Time" Christianity

"But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you as well."

Matthew 6:33

There is no such thing as "Part Time" Discipleship

The Smith's had lived a "normal" Christian life for many years. They believed in God, attended church sporadically, and threw a few bucks into the offering plate as it passed by... etc. For them, God was an important "part" of their lives – along with other significant activities, such as work, study, family time and entertainment.



After many years, they began to attend a small group Bible study and become more fully involved in the things of God. The change was noticeable. Spiritual things began to take priority in their use of time and resources. They attended services more faithfully; began to tithe; pray in the home; and seek opportunities to serve God with their time and talents. God had come to occupy the *principal* place in their individual and family lives.

Their son summed up the change by commenting...

"Mommy, before we were 'part time' Christians, but now we're 'full time' Christians!" 1

The Objective of Level III is to become "full time" Christians – Comitting to God our time, resources, relationships and "self."

For Discussion - What do you think are some of the differences between a "part time" and "full time" believer?

Some hallmarks of a "full time" Disciple

- Serves Jesus as "Lord" and not just "Savior"
- Seeks to live every day as if Jesus were returning that evening
- Cultivates spiritual passion through daily prayer, scripture reading and fasting
- Knows and seeks to fulfill their life mission
- Uses time and money according to spiritual priorities
- Has a servant's heart
- Submits to civil and church authorities
- Works well with others and resolves conflict in a Christ-like manner
- Gives a positive Christian example in the workplace through an ethic of excellence



Level III Exercises – "No pain, no gain!"

In the process of this course we will plan specific activities to learn better how to live a more fully committed life.

- *Monitoring our hearts in the "moments" of daily life* (Lesson #2) Exercises to analyze particular "moments" from daily life in light of eternal values
- Appointments with God— (Lesson #3) We will return to the concept of a daily time for private prayer and reflection on the word of God.
- *Extended Fasting* (Lesson #3) Plan an extended fast of two or more days during the course of the semester.
- *Extended Seasons of Prayer* (Lesson #3) Plan to attend a special meeting for prayer: early morning, late night, or a retreat.
- **Declaration of my Personal Life Mission** (Lesson #4) By using questions for self evaluation, we will seek to discern some components of our life mission, and compose an initial "personal mission statement."

- Evaluation of my personal preferences for conflict resolution (Lesson #9) Using a particular case of conflict from our own life, we will attempt to evaluate our own personal approach to conflict resolution.
- Evaluation of my testimony at my "secular" job (Lesson #10) We consider specific ways to provide a Christian example through our "secular" work.



Counting the Cost The Radical Call to follow Jesus as Lord

The "Cost" of Discipleship - Take up our cross - daily!

Our Goal in this lesson is to – Understand better the radical and far reaching nature of the call to be a genuine disciple of Jesus

We consider...

• The difference between genuine grace and "cheap" grace

• The extreme nature of commitment to Christ as Lord

- The joy of a committed life
- The need for self-examination and honesty

1. Genuine Grace v. Cheap Grace

Salvation is free – but discipleship costs!

Salvation is by Grace!

⁸ For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—⁹ not by works, so that no one can boast. **Ephesians 2:8-9**

We cannot earn the love of God!

⁸ But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Romans 5:8

It does not matter how often we pray; how much we give; how sacrificially we serve - <u>God loves</u> <u>us the same!</u>

We are sons and not slaves! Read 15:11-32

What did the younger son think he needed to do in order to win back the love and acceptance of his father? How did the reality of the situation differ from this expectation?



Why was the older son so miserable?	With what attitude did he serve his Father?

We are called to be radical, but *the love of God cannot be won or lost by our good Works*. God loves us unconditionally!

No Cheap Grace! True Discipleship involves cost

Our salvation in Christ is absolutely free – by grace – but this grace is not cheap! True discipleship, like any commitment in life, has a price.

Cheap Grace...

- Is the grace "we give ourselves."²
- Is the grace which permits us to enjoy all the benefits of the Christian life, without fulfilling the responsibilities which this commitment entails
- Is the grace which allows us to use the name "Christian" without putting Christ first in our lives.
- Is the grace which allows us to be religious, fulfilling certain "obligations" without consulting God and his Word about how we should conduct our daily lives.

The Cost of Discipleship -. Submit ourselves to Christ as our Lord, putting him first in every area of life.

2. The Cost of a Commitment

Every commitment in life has a cost!

Marriage

In order to marry – one must renounce other flirtations. Imagine a groom who asks to include the following sentiment in his marital vows ...

I accept to live with you, enjoy physical intimacy, and share a home, a name and children. But I reserve the right to go out on dates with other women now and again...."

While love may be unconditional, the true marital vows set a high price on enjoying this loving relationship!

Citizenship - An oath of loyalty to the flag

In order to become a citizen of any country, one must agree to honor the laws and obligations of that nation. Imagine a candidate for citizenship who proposes the following, self-styled, loyalty oath...

"I promise to live in this country, receive the benefits of the police, fire department and schools – but I reserve the right to abstain from paying taxes, to ignore laws I do not find convenient, and even sell arms to the enemies of this country should it be in my own financial best interest...etc.."

What nation would accept such a citizen?

The Military

In order to become a soldier – one must submit to military discipline and learn to obey orders without question or delay. Imagine the following vow for those enlisting for military service...

"I commit myself to be a member of the armed forces of this nation – to wear the snazzy uniform with the shiny buttons and medals – but I do not agree to have my hair cut and reserve the right to question those orders which seem uncomfortable or difficult to execute, depending on my feelings at the moment...etc.."

What army would accept soldiers such as this?

What is the "cost" of a commitment with Christ?

We read the following parable...

The Pearl of Great Price

How much? The Cost of Discipleship

In Chapter 13 of Matthew we read that Jesus compared the Kingdom of God to a businessman who dealt in fine pearls. When he found the pearl of great value, he sold everything in order to purchase it.

We know that many Christians interpret the pearl mentioned in this parable to represent us, and the businessman to represent Jesus, who gave all to redeem us. But now we realize that He, Christ, is the pearl of great price, and we are that treasure hunter who seeks happiness, security, fame and eternity.

Once we find Jesus, we ought to give all that we posses to "have" him. He possesses happiness, joy, peace, healing, security, eternity – everything! And therefore we ask the obvious question. "How much does this pearl cost? I want it."

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"Very well," says the salesman, "it is extremely expensive."
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We think for a few moments. "Very good, I have decided. I'm going to buy it!" we exclaim.

- "Excellent. How much do you have?" he asks. "Let's set the price."
- "I have \$30,000 in the bank."
- "Ok, \$30,000. What else?"
- "That's it. That's all I have."
- "You mean to say you do not have anything else?
- "Well, I guess I have a few bucks here in pocket."
- "How much do you have on you?"



[&]quot;Ok, but how much?" We insist.

[&]quot;It is very, very expensive."

[&]quot;Really? Do you think I can buy it?"

[&]quot;Of course. Anyone can acquire it."

[&]quot;But didn't you just say that it is extremely expensive?"

[&]quot;Yes."

[&]quot;Well then, how much does it cost?"

[&]quot;Everything you own," responds the salesman.

We whip out our wallets and start digging through our pockets, "Let's see... twenty, forty, forty five... that's it. Forty five dollars and ten cents!"

- "Fantastic. What else?"
- "I just told you. Nothing else. That's it!"
- "Where do you live?" He asks.
- "Well, in my house... I have a house."
- "Ok then, the house also," he says as he jots down notes.
- "You mean I'll have to live in my tent??!!"
- "Oh, you have a tent?! The tent also. What else?
- "But if I give you that then I'll have to sleep in my car."
- "A car also? Excellent."
- "Actually, I have two."
- "Wonderful. Both cars will be transferred to my ownership. What else?"
- "Look, you already have my money, my house, my tent, and my two cars. What else do you want?"
 - "Are you single? Do you have any family?
 - "Well... yes, I have a wife and two kids...."
 - "Excellent. Your wife and kids also. What else?"
 - "I don't have anything left!! I'm completely alone and empty!"

Then the salesman exclaims: "But how could I have almost forgotten! YOU! You also! Everything about you and your life becomes mine: Wife, kids, house, money, vehicles and also your person."

Then he adds, "Now listen carefully, for the moment I will allow you to use all of these things, but always remember that they belong to me and that you yourself belong to me and that any time I have need of any of these things we have just mentioned, you must yield them to me, because I am the rightful owner."

Such is the transaction when we choose to belong to Jesus Christ.

Many would like to call themselves Christians and receive benefits of the kingdom of God without renouncing the right to manage their own lives. They desire to know Jesus as their savior, without accepting him as Lord!

In reality none of these characteristics provide a reliable measure of the genuineness of a follower of Jesus as Lord!

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Satan's Temptation –
Don't be so "extreme!" You can be a "normal Christian"

Satan attempts to deceive us into seeking the blessings of God without submitting to the cost of following Jesus in truth.

- It is not necessary to dedicate all your time to Christ
- It is not necessary to dedicate all your belongings to Christ
- It is not necessary to be so *extremist* in your service for the Lord
- You can be a Christian and still have a "normal" life



Read Mark 8:31-38 – Peter's Temptation

Why does Jesus rebuke Peter (and Satan)?
What does it mean to "deny one's self?"
What is the promise for those who are willing to "lose" their lives for Christ and for the gospel?
What does Jesus mean when he says, " because everyone who wants to save his life, will lose it; and everyone who loses his life for my sake and for the gospel, will save it."
We cannot seek a "normal" life! We all dream of the comfort of stable home and family. While there is nothing wrong with such natural human desires, this goal cannot be the main priority for a true disciple.
Read Luke 14:25-34 A Disciple Counts the Cost -
Why is it necessary for the builder to evaluate the cost of a project before laying the foundation?
Why is it necessary for a King to evaluate the requirements of battle before attacking?
What does it mean to "hate" parents, spouse, and children, in your opinion? Are we not called to "love" our neighbor, and much more our families?

The Disciple takes the narrow path

Without guidelines, there is no order


- A train goes nowhere if it leaves the rails
- No one can win a game with no rules
- A driver who leaves the lane risks his life



Likewise in the spiritual dimension. A disciple must follow the narrow path set out in scripture.

Jesus said...

¹³ "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. ¹⁴ But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it. - Matthew 7:13-14




There are some who say - "Being so radical robs the joy from life."

Let's not be Pharisees! -- Arrogant, Bitter and Joy-less

"Radical o Rajatabla" - Fully Committed or Full of ourselves!!

Jesus reserved his most scathing rebukes not for the tax collectors or prostitutes, but for the religious hypocrites of his day – the Pharisees! These religious leaders lived a radical life in every way. They fasted to the point of emaciation; they prayed hours and hours a day; memorized scripture and scrupulously obeyed the requirements of the law. However, while they appeared to be "fully committed" to the Lord, they in fact were simply "Full of themselves!" Their radical religiosity was based not on sincere love for God, but on an arrogant desire to become better than others!! Jesus described them as whitewashed tombs that appeared beautiful on the outside, but inside were filled with dead men's bones! (Matthew)

We can be radical, and still displease the Lord! While their actions reflected radical commitment, their character did not. Instead of the fruit of the Spirit, they were arrogant and acerbic – full of themselves!

Let us not become modern day Pharisees!! As we approach these topics of radical commitment, let us remember that our spiritual intensity and sacrificial behavior in no way earn the love of God or substitute for a loving, humble and merciful heart. Let the grace of Christ constantly sweeten our spirit and keep us focused on Jesus and his mercy, and not our own quest to become spiritual super-heroes! *A radical life is a joyful life!*

C. Full Commitment is a Process – We never "arrive"

The Apostle Paul always sought to be more fully committed

¹² Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. ¹³ Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus. **Philippians 3:12-14**

The example of the Father of a demonized son – "I believe! Help my unbelief!"

²⁴ Immediately the boy's father exclaimed, "I do believe; <u>help me overcome my unbelief!</u>" **Mark 9:24**

How many of have felt like this? We believe in the Lord and have surrendered to him, but at the same time we are painfully aware of how far short we still fall of being fully committed. We do believe, but need God to help us with our remaining unbelief.

Peter's Example – John 12:15-19 – We are not as committed as we think we are!

Peter believed himself to be a fully committed disciple. With sincere bravado, he said the following to Jesus before his arrest...

- ²⁹ Peter declared, "Even if all fall away, I will not."
- ³⁰ "Truly I tell you," Jesus answered, "today—yes, tonight—before the rooster crows twice^[a] you yourself will disown me three times."
- ³¹ But Peter insisted emphatically, "Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you." And all the others said the same. Mark 14:29-31

But as we all know, Peter denied the Lord and later "wept bitterly."

After his failure, Peter admitted his weakness (John 21)

After Peter's fall, Jesus asked him twice...

Simon, son of John, do you love me?
(Using the Greek word, "Agape," which means, "Self-giving love")

In response, Peter answered twice...

Lord, you know I love you.

(Using the Greek word "Fileo," which means "affectionate, fraternal love")

Why do you suppose he answers in this way? Why does Peter not use the highest word, "Agape," to express his love for Christ?

Humbled by his failures, Peter knew that his love still lacked full commitment.

Jesus called Peter to grow in self-giving love as his disciple

Finally, Jesus asked the third time,

"Simon, son of John, do you love me," (using the lower word, "Fileo")

Of course Peter was saddened that Jesus lowered his standard this third time, but answered truthfully;

"Lord, you know all things, you know that I love you." (Fileo).

Jesus will take us "where we are at," and bring us to higher levels of commitment.

In the following verses (John 21:18-19) Jesus predicts Peter's growth, which ironically, will result in a more child-like submission to his heavenly father. He will eventually die a martyr's death, the ultimate expression of "ágape."

Give what you can! Full commitment is a process. Take you cross "daily"




The Question of a true disciple -- What will God say about my actions, words and attitudes in that day of his final judgment of my life?

Two Judgments – the Bible speaks of the ultimate judgment on our lives before the great white throne (Rev. 21). This judgment decides our ultimate salvation or damnation completely on the basis on or faith, or lack of faith, in Jesus Christ the Savior. However, the Bible also teaches that "we will all appear before the judgment seat of Christ" where the content of our lives will be evaluated. In this moment we will receive either praise and honor from God or shame and regret. This awesome moment of God's evaluation of our lives should inform our daily life.

Our Goal - in this lesson - to begin to cultivate an eternal perspective in daily living

We consider...

- How our lives will be evaluated?
- The difference between the judgment for salvation and the judgment of our works
- How to view life through an eternal perspective?
- Exercises for self-examination in light of the final judgment of our lives
 - o How am I using my time?
 - o If Jesus were to return today, how might I live differently?
 - Who really controls my life and decisions, moment by moment?





¹⁰ For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each of us may receive what is due us for the things done while in the body, whether good or bad. 2 Corinthians 5:10

¹ This, then, is how you ought to regard us: as servants of Christ and as those entrusted with the mysteries God has revealed. ² Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful. ³ I care very little if I am judged by you or by any human court; indeed, I do not even judge myself. ⁴ My conscience is clear, but that does not make me innocent. It is the Lord who judges me. ⁵ Therefore judge nothing before the appointed time; wait until the Lord comes. 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We cannot earn salvation – but we do earn "crowns!"

Our "works" do not go before us, but they do follow us!

The book of Revelation uses an interesting phrase about the good works of believers. While our works do not bring us to heaven, in a mysterious way, they do accompany us. The precise nature of "rewards" remains mysterious, but the concept emerges repeatedly in the Biblical teaching on heaven.

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on." "Blessed indeed," says the Spirit, "that they may rest from their labors, for their deeds follow them!" **Revelations** 14:13

The Judgment before the great White throne – Read Revelation 20:11-21:8

According to this text, the only ones who will survive this particular judgment are those whose names are written in the book of life. How does one's name become recorded there?

We are saved by faith and not by works!

* For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— onot by works, so that no one can boast. **Ephesians 2:8-9**

Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those that are in Christ Jesus... Romans 8:1

... But our works in the Lord will be evaluated one day! Paul said...

⁷ I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. ⁸ Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing. 2 Timothy 4:7-8

An Eternal Perspective – "Eternity stamped on our Eyes"

The great revivalist pastor and theologian, Jonathan Edwards, before he preached his famous, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God" in 1740, said the following prayer...

"Lord, stamp eternity on my eyes!"

With this vision of eternity – of heaven and of hell – he preached with an anointing that provoked a tremendous revival that spread to thousands in the region. A perspective informed by eternity helps us to live a life of true commitment to the Lord – thinking not primarily of our own happiness or comfort, but of the purposes of the kingdom of God.

"If only...!!!" - The cry of the unprepared

As students, how many of us lamented, "if only" On more than a few occasions. We procrastinated and failed to prepare sufficiently for the big exam, and found ourselves unprepared when the moment of truth arrived. We lamented...

"If only I had studied more!"

"If only I had not wasted so much time in meaningless things!"

Likewise in the Christian life, all too often we fail to take advantage of the opportunities God has provided to invest our lives into His eternal purposes. Like the youth who fails to prepare for the big test, we can come to our ultimate judgment day poorly prepared for God's final evaluation of our lives.

We will lament...

"If only I had taken advantage of the opportunities I had to serve the Lord!"

If we were to dwell on this reality – that all we do will be tested done day – how might our lifestyle change?

¹⁰ By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as a wise builder, and someone else is building on it. But each one should build with care. ¹¹ For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ. ¹² If anyone builds on this foundation using gold, silver, costly stones, wood, hay or straw, ¹³ their work will be shown for what it is, because the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each person's work. ¹⁴ If what has been built survives, the builder will receive a reward. ¹⁵ If it is burned up, the builder will suffer loss but yet will be saved—even though only as one escaping through the flames. 1 Corinthians 3:10-15

No sloppy building - no hack jobs in our lives! "Wood, hay and stubble..."

When a true craftsman inspects a sloppily built house, he might exclaim, "Hack job!" Some materials, and some buildings, last better than others. Likewise in the way we "construct" our lives, everything will one day be inspected by the Lord, tested with fire. How are you building the "house" of your life? What type of materials, which is to say, activities, will last the ultimate testing of God? Do we invest our energies into that which has eternal significance?

Distractions are "thorns" that choke our lives!

"And others are the ones sown among the thorns. They are those who hear the word, but the cares of the world and the deceitfulness of riches and the desires for other things enter in and choke the word, and it proves unfruitful." Mark 4:18-19

Many activities fill our time, but have no eternal value. Jesus refers to these activities and distractions in the parable of the sower, when he refers to the thorns that choke out the plant and keep it from bearing fruit. Like straw, these activities take up space, but have little substance, and burn easily. These "distractions" can easily fill our days and nights and take our attention away from the purposes of the kingdom. Some such activities may appear to be valuable, and even religious, but do not line up with God's will for our life at that particular time. Take note of some activities that you might be tempted to do this week which in all likelihood would not stand the test of fire before the throne of God.

Am I living, in this moment, under the control and Lordship of Jesus Christ?


¡Throne Check! - consider the throne - the control room - of your life. Who is calling the shots?



When we do a "Throne Check," we stop for a moment to consider our *interior throne* – who is really in charge? Am I acting, feeling and speaking according to *God's will, my will, or the will*

Radical Spirituality How to Cultivate Spiritual Passion

Because of the increase of wickedness, the love of most will grow cold... Matthew 24:12

Lukewarmness - Our Spiritual Enemy!

It is all too possible to be a Christian and yet close the door in Jesus' face! The degree of fellowship and intimacy with Christ we enjoy depends, to a large extent, on our own desire, or lack thereof. In the account of the Laodicean believers we observe a tragic scene – Christians who close the door to Jesus, who invites them to spend time in intimate fellowship over a meal. So many such moments exist, day by day, in which Jesus would enter more deeply into our lives to share intimately with us, *but it is we who keep the door shut!*

2. Renew your appointments with God!

¡Plan appointments with God!

- 1. Designate a specific time Put it on the calendar!
- 2. Designate a specific place, without distractions. Turn off the cell phone!

Seek a private place, free of interruptions, telephones, crying babies and the incessant din of television and radio.

Biblical Examples of Appointments with God

- *Jesus* taught the importance of shutting the door of your room and praying to God in private. (Matthew 6:5-15) Scripture records that he was in the habit of going to the Mount of Olives to pray in private. (Luke 22:39)
- *Moses* went regularly to the Tent of Meeting, outside the camp, to meet with the Shekina Presence of God. The Divine cloud of fire descended on this place and Moses spoke with God "face to face as a man speaks with his friend."
- *Daniel* prayed three times at set times every day in his room, beside a particular window. (Dan 6:10).
- *Peter* prayed on a quiet roof at twilight, after dinner. (Acts 10)

The place and time could be different for each of us, but what is important is that it be a comfortable and solitary place, so that you can pray in a concentrated way without interruptions.



Seek a place conducive to concentration (that can be visited every day)

- Not a moving car in traffic
- Not the shower
- Not the bed
- Not an office with the telephones ringing
- Not a mountainside lake that can only be visited twice a year

- *Use Psalms*. The Prayer Manual of the Bible can be extremely helpful for extended seasons of prayer.
- *Move!* Do not feel obliged to remain kneeling or sitting for hours on end. One can pray pacing or walking as well!
- *Allow "spaces"* One need not fill every moment with words. Extended silences are "ok."
- *Variety*. One need not monologue the entire time. Sing. Read scripture. Observe silence. Journal. Speak in tongues. All of these activities can become part of the prayer.

We can find moments for prayer hidden among the crevices of our daily activities. One need not even find a private place, but grab the moment "right there" and experience communion with God in the places of every day life.

6. Meditate on the Word of God – Eat and Digest the Word

Definition of Meditation – *Take time to consider profoundly the words of a particular verse, personalize them and allowing the Spirit to apply them to our lives.*

- "Make the verse my very own!" (A student of Level I)
- "I let the Psalm carry me away..." (A student of Level I)



How to meditate on the word?

• Choose a particular verse out of a general Reading.

<u>Example</u> – "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want." **Psalm 23:1**

- *Concentrate* on this verse for two or three minutes (at least), repeating it and thinking about the meaning of each word.
- Personalize and Pray it

Example – "The Lord is not merely a shepherd to everyone, but he is also my shepherd. He knows me by name. He knows every hair on my head. Thank you, Lord, my shepherd, that I'm never alone in life. I ask you to guide me and provide for my every need....etc."



Sing it!

Try something a little bit different. Instead of only praying the verse and thinking about it, try singing it! Improvise, and let your heart carry you away. When we worship God with his inspired word, it takes life within us!

7. Intercession – The Spiritual Struggle of a true Disciple

A radical disciple is called to spend hours in regular intercession for the kingdom of God to come! Revival in general, and spiritual growth of the individual, depend on this discipline.

Examples of Intense Intercession in the Word of God

Jeremiah – Jeremiah was a prophet who struggled in prayer for his people...

and my eyes a fountain of tears!

I would weep day and night
for the slain of my people. Jeremiah 9:1

Paul - Paul's ministry consisted of much more than preaching. He interceded for hours and hours in private as well....

"...² To this end I strenuously contend with all the energy Christ so powerfully works in me.. I want you to know how hard I am contending for you and for those at Laodicea, and for all who have not met me personally. Colossians 1:29 – 2:1

Hannah - Burdened by the agony of her infertility Hannah prayed with intensity and desperation. God answered and gave her a son – the prophet Samuel, which means, "God hears."

Once when they had finished eating and drinking in Shiloh, Hannah stood up. Now Eli the priest was sitting on his chair by the doorpost of the LORD's house. ¹⁰ In her deep anguish Hannah prayed to the LORD, weeping bitterly. ¹¹ ... ¹² As she kept on praying to the LORD, Eli observed her mouth. ¹³ Hannah was praying in her heart, and her lips were moving but her voice was not heard. Eli thought she was drunk ¹⁴ Hannah replied, "I am a woman who is deeply troubled. I have not been drinking wine or beer; I was pouring out my soul to the LORD. ¹⁶ Do not take your servant for a wicked woman; I have been praying here out of my great anguish and grief." **1 Samuel 1:9-16**

And you? Do you plod through life, hoping to make it to the weekend? Or do you live with intentionality, aiming to fulfill a divinely given mission?

According to the Bible, each one of us possesses a heavenly mission to serve God and advance His kingdom on earth. He has fashioned us purposefully to contribute to his cosmic plan of redemption in a unique way. Our part is to discover that loving intention, and live it out!

1. Having a Mission Keeps us on track – it keeps us from detours and major missteps in life planning

Jesus needed to resist strong and pressing distractions

Urgent demands of circumstances and those around us can easily derail us in fulfilling our life mission. Consider the example of Jesus...

- ³⁵ Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed. ³⁶ Simon and his companions went to look for him, ³⁷ and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!"
- ³⁸ Jesus replied, "Let us go somewhere else—to the nearby villages—so I can preach there also. That is why I have come." ³⁹ So he traveled throughout Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons. Mark 1:35-39

Because he kept his mission foremost in his mind through prayer and reflection, he was able to say "no" to the demands of those around him, however well-intentioned they may have been. Our mission keeps our "eyes on the prize"



Features of a Mission Statement

- It should dream of the stars: Some dreams are God-given. By faith, we "call things that are not, as though they were." Many times we write down that which seems unattainable, only to return to these words years later, praising God for his ability to make our dreams come true.
- It should have feet on the ground: While we want to exercise faith and vision, this statement should be rooted to some extent in your present reality. There exists a line between faith and fantasy.
- It should become increasingly specific over the years: An initial mission statement may be general in nature, but over the years it should become increasingly refined and specific.
- *It should be "summarize-able"* A Mission that cannot be remembered is less useful in daily living than one which can be repeated, almost as a slogan.

For example, consider the following famous "mission statements"

- o "Bringing happiness to millions" Disney
- o "Exceptional care without exception" Boston Medical Center
- o "Follow without holding anything back" (Lyrics from a song)
- o "Crossing barriers to impact lives for Christ" a missionary pastor

- o "A worshiper of God and a deliverer of men" Mike Bickle

Our Goal is to consider ways to organize our time more effectively and wisely, in a way that reflects our mission statement and the priorities of the kingdom of God.

We consider...

- What it means to "steward" our time?
- How self control is critical in our ability to manage our time?
- How the <u>urgent</u> in life drives us, often at the expense of that which is truly <u>important</u> in God's eyes.
- How to plan to do that which is truly important from an eternal perspective.

Self Control – The Key to Making the most of our time

Who is the captain of your boat?

Self control demonstrates the fruit of the Holy Spirit in our lives. God is our supreme commander in life, but he commissions each of us to "*captain*" the ship of our individual lives. With the anointing of the Holy Spirit empowering us, we posses the holy duty to direct our own lives, planning how to use our time and resources to accomplish the mission God has given us.



If we do not control our time - others will!

Without planning, we do not accomplish what we set out to do!

How many of us know that "intentions" alone are insufficient – We must execute! -

¹³ ...for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose. Philippians 2:13

Example: The discipline of prayer.

We all want to pray. 99% of the time, we neglect to pray not for lack of desire or intention, but for lack of proper *organization*. We do not pray because we do not plan prayer. Can you say with certainty, when and where you plan to pray during each day of this week? If not, most likely by this time next week you will have prayed very little. One must plan when and where to do that which is important in life!

We must "steward" our time – Our time is not our own!

We do not "own" our time! God has graciously given us a certain number of hours and minutes to fulfill His calling in our lives. He will one day call us to account for how we used each moment – for good or ill!

Wasting time = Wasting life

Time is life. Each moment presents us with a holy decision: Will I use this moment to accomplish something of eternal significance? Will I use this moment to advance God's kingdom and purposes in my life? Managing time well determines our "success" in every sense – spiritual, emotional and physical. If we fail to make the most of the time, we waste the "stuff" of our lives. *If we fail to plan, we plan to fail.*

We all will give account for our use of time

"We have each been entrusted with sufficient time to do the whole will of God and to fill out His perfect plan for our lives.... The problem is not that of needing more time, but of making better use of the time we have. Let us face the fact squarely that each of us has as much time as anyone else in the world. The president of the United States of America has twenty-four hours to his day, and so have we. Others may have more ability, influence, or money than we, but they have no more time.... Although we cannot be held responsible for our capacity, we are responsible for the strategic employment of our time..." 6

This is to say, wasting time is sin!

How do we invest our "free" time?

"After making a generous allowance of eight hours a day for sleep and rest – and few really need more than that – three hours a day for meals and social intercourse, ten hours a day for work and travel on five days, there still remain no fewer than thirty five hours unaccounted for in each week. What happens to them? How are the extra two days in the week invested? The whole of a man's contribution to the kingdom of God might well turn upon how those crucial hours are employed. They will determine whether his life will be commonplace or extraordinary." ⁷

Full Time Christians – 100% for God! No "part-timers!"

Part Time Christianity -- relegates God to the "religious" compartment of our lives.

The part time Christian divides his or her time into compartments:

- 1. Church activities ... For God
- 2. Work To earn money
- 3. Personal time.... To fulfill my desires and be entertained

The part time Christian considers himself to be the master of his own time

He says...

After fulfilling my obligations to God through church related activities, and after fulfilling my responsibilities to my employer at work, I can use my time as I like. I ask myself, "What would I like to do with my free time?"

Full time Christianity – Use all my time, whether at church, home or at work, for God!

The true disciple dedicates 100% of his time to God

- 1. Church Activities... For God
- 2. Work *For God*
- 3. Personal timefor God

The radical disciple says...

I am a "full time" Christian. I do not own my own time. Whatever I do, whether serving in a church ministry, mowing the lawn, working at the computer, playing with my kids or taking a nap... it is all for God! The question I ask for every moment and every activity: What does God want me to do?

Sabbath Rest: Busy-ness is not next to Godliness!

The Sabbath day of rest crowned the creation of the universe itself. God rested! Under the Old Covenant, God commanded his people also to observe a day of rest. While the New Covenant does not include obligations about the ceremonial observation of feasts, festivals and Sabbath days (Colossians 3:16-17), the writer of Hebrews explains that there remains a "Sabbath rest" for the people of God, found ultimately in a relationship with Jesus. By his ultimate sacrifice, we can be righteous before him apart from our own efforts. We can "rest" in his work on the cross. And yet the principle remains from the very creation of the world, that regular, cyclical rest honors God and cooperates with the rhythms of His creation.

If there is one thing that the story of Mary and Martha teaches, it is that holy "leisure" can and does honor God, when focused on Jesus. Especially urban, North American society glorifies a type of busy-ness which impoverishes our soul. Thanks to certain technological developments, we can be interrupted by the demands of our occupations at any time, in any place. We live tethered to our technology, quite literally. Observing "Sabbath" through moments, days, and entire seasons of rest and separation helps us to cultivate wonder and passion in our love for Christ. Such "holy leisure" honors God more than a compulsive drive to engage in constant, frenetic activity. When we cease striving, we recognize that the world spins apart from our own exertions and we remember who truly "makes things tick."

Busy-ness can distract us from our true mission. See Mark 1:35-39

³⁵ Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed. ³⁶ Simon and his companions went to look for him, ³⁷ and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!"

³⁸ Jesus replied, "Let us go somewhere else—to the nearby villages—so I can preach there also. That is why I have come." ³⁹ So he traveled throughout Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons.

Jesus did not heal everyone! After healing Peter's mother-in-law and hundreds of suffering people until late the previous evening, Jesus awoke early, before dark, to seek God in solitude and stillness. At daybreak Peter and the crowds found Jesus and demanded his attention. "Jesus, what are you doing here in the middle of nowhere, being so unproductive!? There are more people to be healed and everyone is looking for you!" Jesus calmly informed them that he needed to move on to the next town in order to fulfill the mission God had given him. This moment of solitude and stillness enabled him to reconnect with his calling before his father, and enable him to say "no" to the urgent, pressing needs around him.

As we will see in the analysis below, much of our busy-ness, even when doing something good and positive, can distract us from accomplishing God's truly important purposes in our lives. We must discern that which is truly important for us to do in order to fulfill God's purposes in our lives, and resist the temptation to respond instinctively to every urgency that clamors for our attention.

How are you using your time?

If we desire truly to live as a disciple, we must evaluate how we use our time. The graphic below, drawn from the work of Stephen Covey, helps us to analyze our use of time through four general categories of activity in terms of importance and urgency.

Activities can be...

- 1. Urgent and important
- 2. Important but not urgent
- 3. Urgent but not important
- 4. Not urgent and not important

Study these quadrants and ask yourself, Which quadrant best represents my life? How am I using my time?

Our Goal - <u>Maximize Quadrant #2</u> - Why?

Quadrant I – Emergencies! Many emergencies can be prevented! Procrastination or poor planning results in many crises which could have been avoided. Through proper advance planning, ie. Level #2 behaviors, we can multiply peace and effectiveness.

Quadrant III – <u>Interruptions or Side-tracks</u> - So many competing concerns clamor for our attention and energy. If we fail to discern that which important, prioritize and place appropriate boundaries, then these pressing needs can drive our lives. We say "yes" to everything and find ourselves constantly busy without accomplishing God's calling on our lives.

Quadrant IV – <u>Time Wasters</u> - Many activities lack meaning. We lose ourselves before a screen!

Quadrant #1 - Urgent and Important -- Must be done NOW"! The Quadrant of Emergencies!

Examples:

- Exam tomorrow and I have to study!
- Christmas tomorrow and I have to buy presents!
- The car broke down and I have to get it fixed now!
- The bill is due and must be paid today!
- You are sick and must see a doctor right away!



What happens when we dwell in "the urgent?"

- We live in a constant state of emergency
- We neglect that which is important in order to attend to that which is pressing
- We find ourselves putting out fires without advancing in our life mission
- Anxiety and Stress produce an excess of adrenaline, resulting in health problems
- We cause some crises that could have been prevented
- We neglect prayer and scripture study in order to respond to constant emergencies
- We neglect our physical, spiritual and emotional health

Procrastination – The sin of quadrant #1

Examples

- You put off the oil change until the car breaks down
- You put off studying until the night before the exam, resulting in an all-nighter
- You don't make time to exercise and eventually suffer preventable health problems
- You are too busy to spend time with family, and then when the kids experience problems, there is not a deep enough relationship to intervene effectively.

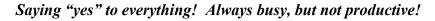

The Quadrant of Distractions





So many things clamor for our attention which are not truly important or significant.

Examples

- The phone rings and we answer automatically, regardless of what this call is interrupting
- A friend invites you out to a movie. You put off studying and go in order not to disappoint her.
- You agree to do certain favors for people in order not to offend them.

What happens when we live in quadrant #3? *** We say "no" to that which is truly important!**

- We live with a short term mentality
- We depend too much on the opinions of others
- We neglect long term plans and goals
- We feel like a "victim" in life out of control
- Important relationships suffer from neglect
- We neglect prayer and private study
- We neglect health and rest

Question: What if the "interruptions" are also "important?" Should we not be interruptible to some extent?

Yes! In one instance, Jesus was pushing through a crowd to get to the home of a synagogue ruler and heal his daughter before it was too late. Yet he paused in the crowd to look for a woman who had touched him in faith and been healed. Then, as if he had all the time in the world, he listened to her story and expressed love for her. He allowed himself to be "interruptible," even when responding to crises! And yet at other times he said "no" to pressing needs in order to fulfill his overall mission.

More often than not, urgency that clamors for our attention is not frivolous, but important in its own right. One must learn to discern *God's will* amidst the many important things we can do!

Lack of Boundaries – The sin of quadrant #3!

"People Pleasing" -- We desperately want to avoid disappointing others, so we make promises we cannot fulfill. We react to the demands of others and scramble to fulfill their expectations.

Example:

- Someone invites you to an activity and you say "yes," and as a result skip your prayer time.
- The phone rings during play time with you son, and you answer rather than giving your undivided attention to your son.

Time Wasters – Unproductive Activity Many activities can be healthy and constructive in moderation, but when done in excess, become useless or even counter-productive. The key phrase - "too much."

- Sleep too much
- Watch TV, movies or sports too much
- Surf the Net too much
- Talk on the phone too much
- Face book too much
- Hang out in the mall or the gym too much
- Take drugs or alcohol

What happens when we dwell in Quadrant #4?

- Irresponsibility in life
- Fired from jobs
- Debt
- Dependency on others for our provision
- Neglect of emotional, physical and spiritual health

Why do we waste time in that which has no eternal significance?

Laziness -- "counterfeit rest" - The sin of Quadrant #4

Sleeping, resting, or engaging in leisure activities can honor God when done wisely, with an appropriate theology of Sabbath. When we focus these activities on God we experience "recreation" in our "recreation." True rest energizes us to love God and our neighbor, fulfilling our mission. Counterfeit rest through excessive or unedifying leisure activity dulls our soul, body and spirit. Wisdom will enable us to balance our lifestyle in a way that discerns restorative leisure from time-wasting activity.

Questions about Stewardship

Is it necessary to tithe in the church where a person attends, or is it possible to tithe to some other ministry?

We teach that one should tithe *in the church one attends*. Offering to other ministries is commendable, but one should be faithful to the local church one attends. If someone moves from Boston, he or she can certainly send offerings to Lion of Judah if they want, but the tithe should be to their new, local congregation.

Does the pastor receive and manage all the money collected in the general offering?

NO! The pastors and other staff of the church receive a regular salary decided by the deacon board of the church. These salaries constitute a portion of the overall expenses of the church. The pastors do not manage the money collected on Sunday and generally *do not know how much each member gives!* The deacons manage this information.

How are the tithes and offerings used in our church, Lion of Judah?

There is a budget of expenses of the church. This budget, decided by the deacons, is presented publicly in congregational meetings every year and formally approved. Any member of the church can request permission from the deacons to review the budget of the church.

These regular expenses include:

- Mortgage for properties
- Maintenance of properties
- New building projects
- Gas, electricity, water...etc.
- Materials and training for the various ministries
- Contributions to local and foreign missions

Should I tithe weekly, or monthly?

One should tithe with discipline and regularity, in whatever schedule one chooses. Under normal circumstances, we recommend that a family set aside a certain amount of money each week, as Paul counsels the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 16:1-3). Some receive their salary every two weeks and prefer to tithe in this schedule, in order to be sure that the this money set aside for tithing does not end up being used for other purposes.

Is saving money sinful or demonstrate a lack of faith?

No. Saving for the future is wise and Biblical. (See Proverbs). It is sin, however, to *trust* in our savings for our sense of security and to refuse to be generous or faithful in order to pad our savings. (as did the Rich Fool). Prudent and wise saving, however, allows us to have discretion to cover unexpected expenses in our own lives, and also to be generous when opportunities arise.

Is it bad to build up a credit card debt?

Yes. Scriptures presents debt as a negative thing in the life of a believer. (Prov. 22:7) "The debtor is slave to the lender." Some expenses in our society require taking loans, such as owning a house, or a car, or paying college tuition. But apart from these specific cases, we do not advise people to acquire debt, especially with credit cards that charge exorbitant interest.

Is it good to have a budget?

Yes. God calls us to exercise self control. If we fail to plan how we will apportion our money, more likely than not we will spend on that which lacks value in the eyes of God. Drawing up a budget is wise and important for a mature Christian. There are many ways to make a budget, which are beyond the scope of this lesson, but we present a worksheet (see addendum) as a simple model. We also recommend that one note down each expenditure in order to keep track of how our money is being spent. All too often our money mysteriously disappears and we cannot explain how.

How can I find more training about this matter?

The church offers an excellent, internationally known curriculum called "Crown Financial Ministries." We recommend this course highly.

Our Goal is to learn the importance of submission for radical discipleship.

- How can we know if we have a rebellious heart?
- Why rebellion is such a serious sin in the Christian life?

Rebellious Christians?! Is that possible?

Absolutely! In the name of the Lord himself we regularly rebel against parents, teachers, employers, pastors and civil leaders, always blaming the one in authority for being the "bad guy." This fundamental flaw severely limits our blessing and usefulness in the kingdom of God!

And you...? Do you have a rebellious or submissive heart?

Ask ourselves the following questions....

- How do you respond to the parking lot attendant who asks you to move your car?
- How do you respond to the usher who asks you to change seats?
- How do you respond to your boss when he or she asks you to do something differently?
- Do you follow traffic laws?
- How do you respond to the ministry leader who asks you to do something you would rather not do?
- What do you do when the pastor does or says something that "rubs you the wrong way?"
- Do you complain about your boss, pastor, or ministry leader?
- Do you tend to blame others when there is conflict in your life?

Rebellious people tend to blame others for conflict in their lives.

- You are fired from your job My boss had it "in for me!"
- You lose a friend They have "issues!"
- You get a parking ticket The police should be doing more important things!
- You change churches The pastor's did not pay enough attention to me!

In reality, such attitudes rebel not so much against specific people, but against God, the ultimate authority, who has placed these individuals in authority.

Job struggled at length to come to terms with his situation, and we finally learn that neither explanation was true. Job's suffering had nothing to do with punishment, but neither was God senseless or unjust by allowing it. In some mysterious way, God allows and uses suffering to mold us. Much as the coach or the drill sergeant "disciplines" his chosen recruits, so also God allows struggle to mature us spiritually. This discipline has nothing to do with punishment, and everything to do with our spiritual formation into maturity and the likeness of Christ. (Romans 8:28)

Peter, before denying the Lord, boasted of his radical commitment and willingness to follow, even to the point of death!

³⁰ "Truly I tell you," Jesus answered, "today—yes, tonight—before the rooster crows twice ^[a] you yourself will disown me three times."
³¹ But Peter insisted emphatically, "Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you." And all the others said the same. Mark 14:29-31

3. God breaks us through long seasons of waiting - the Desert

We know the awesome power of Moses' leadership and authority – that he waged war against the greatest pagan superpower of his day. How can such a strong leader also be considered the "meekest man on the face of the earth?")e

The desert - God's training camp!

Moses wasn't always so meek! Having been raised in the very palace of the Pharoe, he grew up with the self confidence of a prince. As a young man, he became enraged when he witnessed an Egyptian abusing an Israelite, and took matters into his own hands by killing the Egyptian. Burning with zeal to save his people, he assumed the role of deliverer and tried to intervene in a dispute between two Israelites. However, before he could fulfill



his destiny as deliverer, God needed to deal with his pride and will. Moses fled in fear from Egypt and hid as a fugitive in the desert. Having lost his privileged position in Egyptian society, he lived forty years in complete anonymity before being called by the Lord.

Why the desert?



The desert is a place of privation and need. We become deeply aware of our human fragility, and all our pretence of self-sufficiency melts away. Stripped of all our natural supports, we become obliged to depend on the Lord, and learn that "man does not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God."

The Case of David and Saul – "Touch not the Anointed of the Lord"

David had opportunity to take revenge against Saul!

You think your boss is bad!? King Saul attempted to pin David to a wall with a spear out of sheer jealously - twice! David fled as a fugitive, hiding in caves and deserts, while Saul and his army sought to kill him. In spite of all this, David refused to do harm to his legitimate king. On one occasion, David entered a cave with his men, to find Saul there, relieving himself! At long last, he had his chance at revenge, seemingly provided by the Lord himself. His men encouraged him—"Kill him!"

Radical Service Washing the Feet of the Saints

"For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

- Mark 10:45

"The one who doesn't serve – serves for nothing!"

Ministry = Service: The word, "minister," means literally, "to serve."

Our Goal in this lesson is to learn to cultivate a mentality of servant hood in all we do: "How to be radical servants!"

The Servant Heart – The child and the cup of water

There once was a young boy who lived with his family in a small country house alongside the Appalachian Trail. Every day dozens of travelers would pass by as they walked along this nature trail, often in the blazing heat of summer. This child would entertain himself on sweltering summer afternoons by setting up a lemonade stand along this trail and giving away cold drinks to the hikers who passed by, free of charge. It never occurred to him to profit from this service, since "the fun of it" lay in the joy of giving something special that would refresh

others.

As an adult believer in Christ, this man began to receive special revelations from God—"prophetic words"—from God. By the power of the Holy Spirit, he receives personal messages to share with people that would bless and "refresh" their weary souls!

Consider how the heart and motivation of a person connects to their spiritual "anointing." This man had a true "servant heart." He enjoyed giving to others and refreshing their spirit. God used this heart of love as a vehicle through which the Spirit would give prophetic words – cups of cold water – to encourage and satisfy the souls of His thirsty people.

The Radical Servant Wields Spiritual Authority

Who wants to be boss?! Why?

On various occasions the disciples argued amongst themselves as to who would be the greatest; who would take charge when the master had passed on! (Mark 9:33-37; Luke 9:46-48) Even at the Last supper, sitting at table in one of the most sublime moments of human history, a squabble broke out as to who would be the greatest! (Luke 22:24) Consider this example of power-plays and infighting among the apostles.

At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Who, then, is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" ² He called a little child to him, and placed the child among them. ³ And he said: "Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. ⁴ Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. ⁵ And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me. Matthew 18:1-5



2. The Radical Servant is Happy and Attentive

Serves each one as if he or she were "the president"

The radical servant considers "each one to be more important than him or herself."

If the President of the United States were to visit your house tonight. How would you receive him? What type of meal would you prepare? How would you prepare the bed and room where he would sleep? In what state would you leave the bathroom? What would be your attitude towards him? Would you do all this reluctantly?

Every human being se serve is much more important than the President of a merely human nation. The Bible teaches that they are *angels* – or better yet, *Jesus himself* – dressed in disguise!

Illustration of the Foolish Worker

One day a young man was painting a wall in the factory where he worked. A stranger stood by, observing him work for a while. The young man, annoyed by being observed, said to the stranger – "What are you looking at?"

The quiet stranger replied, "My wall."

He was the owner of the factory! If the young man had known the true identity of this stranger, he would have treated him with more attention and respect.

All human beings bear the image of their creator, and as such, deserve the utmost honor and respect, regardless of how this world and the enemy have degraded them.

c. The Radical servant feels privileged to serve – with a smile!

If we view each person as if he or she were the president, or an angel, or our Lord himself – with what attitude would we serve them? Of course, we would be eager, excited and thrilled to do the most menial task in his service!!

"Service with a Smile" -- Don't be a "grouchy waiter!"

Have you ever had a grumpy waiter or waitress? Their demeanor and facial expressions betrayed reluctance at the very least, and perhaps even annoyance as they fulfilled their tasks in a perfunctory fashion. How did you feel? Did you enjoy the meal? Did you leave a big tip?

Most of us feel uncomfortable, or even guilty, when people serve us in this way. We feel as if we are burdening or inconveniencing them by allowing them to serve us. In contrast, consider the feeling when someone seems genuinely happy and grateful for the opportunity to serve you ... as if you were doing them a favor by allowing them to do so!

Let us serve with a smile that comes from within as we view each person as if he or she were inestimably precious. What a privilege to make them happy or help them in some way!!





Are you a "Team Player?"

Many of us, in spite of being mature Christians, prefer to work as "lone rangers" rather than in collaboration with others.

Let's ask ourselves the following questions:

- Do you feel neglected and hurt when others receive recognition?
- Does it bother you when others excel in similar gifts or ministries to your own?

- Do you feel bad when another person in your ministry has gifts that excel yours?

Perhaps you need to learn more about working together with others!

Our Goal in this class is to learn more about how to serve God in unity and collaboration with others, focusing on personal repentance and strategies for conflict resolution.

Obstacle #1

Independence and Pride: The Lone Ranger Syndrome

The Lone Ranger fails to understand...

- That we need one another in the Body of Christ (Interdependence)
- That we are called to work together with others

Christians are by nature "Interdependent" – We need one another!

Interdependence = Mutual need



There is simply no alternative! If we are true believers, we *must* have unity with other believers. In Christ we become members of a family, and whether we like it or not, *family is family!* Scripture also teaches that Christians are "the body of Christ." Just as an arm or a kidney has no other choice; neither do we. We are connected to the other members of the body, or we die!! We cannot "opt out" of sharing with other believers. As Christians, *we are stuck with one another!*"

We are members of One Body: Eyes and Intestines!

¹² Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For we were all baptized by ^[a] one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. ¹⁴ Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

Obstacle to Unity #2 Jealousy and Competition: The Princess

The Princess fails to understand...

- That life is not a beauty contest or competition
- That the success of others does not lessen her
- We "win" in life when we help others to "win" as well!



Is life a Beauty Contest?

Jealousy – a symptom of fear and insecurity

Many of us live as if everything in life were a competition against others. Appearance, possessions, position – even prayer and spirituality, can become the stuff of competition!! Rather than be satisfied with our own progress, we must *be better* than others! We experience envy and jealousy, as if all others are enemies to be "beaten," because their success takes something precious away from us!



Examples

- A three year old child feels displaced and jealous of a newborn sibling
- A worship leader feels jealous of the new member with a beautiful voice.
- A Christian with a prophetic gifting feels rivalry with another church member who begins to receive accurate revelations...etc.

In each case we observe fear and personal insecurity.

Satan's Lie: If the other wins, I lose!

A Kingdom Mentality: We are on the same team! His success is my success!

We worship a God of abundance!⁹ The success of another in no way lowers or lessens me as a person, loved and called by God in my own way. We play for the same team – we fight in the same army against a common enemy – Satan himself. When my teammate scores a goal, or my fellow soldier makes a heroic conquest, I rejoice with him!

Example – The Disciples were envious of other followers of Jesus

³⁸ "Teacher," said John, "we saw someone driving out demons in your name and we told him to stop, because he was not one of us." ³⁹ "Do not stop him," Jesus said. "For no one who does a miracle in my name can in the next moment say anything bad about me, ⁴⁰ for whoever is not against us is for us. Mark 9:38-40

Moses – There's enough anointing to go around! God is a God of Abundance!

If another brother or sister receives a special anointing, does this mean that you become somehow less important? We observe how Moses responded when two men, Eldad and Medad, were anointed and prophesied separately from Moses and the larger group.

²⁶ However, two men, whose names were Eldad and Medad, had remained in the camp. They were listed among the elders, but did not go out to the tent. Yet the Spirit also rested on them, and they prophesied in the camp. ²⁷ A young man ran and told Moses, "Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp." ²⁸ Joshua son of Nun, who had been Moses' aide since youth, spoke up and said, "Moses, my lord, stop them!"

²⁹ But Moses replied, "Are you jealous for my sake? I wish that all the LORD's people were prophets and that the LORD would put his Spirit on them!" **Numbers 11:26-29**

The Call to lift up our brothers

Barnabus - "Son of Encouragement"

Barnabus understood that as Christians we serve on the same team – that we win when we help others to succeed. Consider how Barnabus helped *others* to be more successful than himself.



The Case of Saul – The Art of giving someone a chance

When Saul accepted Christ, everyone rejected him as a former persecutor of the church... except Barnabus!!

²⁶ When he came to Jerusalem, he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him, not believing that he really was a disciple. ²⁷ But Barnabas took him and brought him to the apostles. He told them how Saul on his journey had seen the Lord and that the Lord had spoken to him, and how in Damascus he had preached fearlessly in the name of Jesus. Acts 9:26-27

The Call to Resolve Conflict
In any team, family or army, internal conflict is inevitable. A mature Christians learns how to resolve such conflicts wisely and according to Biblical principles.
²³ "Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has something against you, ²⁴ leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift. Matthew 5:23-24

We generally fail to follow these steps in their proper order. On the contrary, we manage conflict in exactly the opposite order of action steps than that which Jesus teaches. Generally, what is the first thing people do when in conflict with another?

Four Styles in Resolving Differences¹⁰

Observe which way you generally use when in conflict with others.

1. <u>Dominate</u>: *I win – You lose* (Dominant Donald)

One can "win" an argument, but lose a relationship. We quash dissent and inflict divisions in the body. We become increasingly hardened, proud, and embittered.



2. <u>Yield</u>: You win – I lose (Amiable Amanda)



Some of us are simply too nice. We desire to avoid disappointing anyone and thus seek "peace at all costs." We allow ourselves to be trampled by others as human "doormats." While this strategy may seem more "humble" and Christian, in fact it can hamper unity and cause deeper problems in the long run. This person tends to sweep problems under the carpet and internalize anger, rather than resolve important differences. This "stuffing" process can produce bitterness, depression and passive aggressive attempts to sabotage the efforts of others in indirect ways.

Of course, at times this strategy is necessary and prudent. We must "choose our battles," and yield in matters which do not merit our efforts, but generally this strategy does not produce relational health in the body of Christ.

3. <u>Vengeance</u>: *I lose – You lose* (Vengeful Vladimir)

Satan models this style quite well. Knowing that he is destined hellish destruction, he seeks to drag down as many others as possible with him out of sheer spite. On a lighter note, some sports fans feel relief if their hated rival loses, even if their own team also loses. In human conflicts as well, sometimes we do not care if we suffer, as long as the other suffers as well!

4. Resolve: I win – You win (Winsome Winfred)

In Christ, we can find solutions that meet the legitimate needs of both parties. *Both can "win!"* This strategy takes into account the needs of both parties. It requires effort, imagination, and emotional maturity!

- Listening skills: Genuinely hear the views of the other without interrupting
- *Empathy*: Put yourself in the other's position
- *Understanding*: Truly grasp the perspective and needs of the other person
- *Courage*: Express your own perspective in a clear, respectful way
- Creativity: Seek solutions together that meet the legitimate needs of both parties

Rules (Guidelines) for a Fair Fight - (A "Fair Fight")

Words are not easily retracted – Like tooth paste!

A Christian camp counselor once led a group of kids in the following didactic game. He gave each one a small

tube of toothpaste and asked them to squeeze the sticky paste out into their hands. Of course, the messy fun inspired laughter and squeals of delight! But then came the assignment: Return the toothpaste into the tube! Obviously no one could completely force all the paste back into the tube, but they certainly enjoyed the chance to smear and squeeze the stickiness all over themselves!

Our words are much the same! Once spoken, it is extremely difficult to take them back, and we usually make the mess worse! Therefore, we do well to take time to consider certain guidelines or "rules for a fair fight" which can help us resolve conflicts without inflicting lasting damage to the relationship.

Rules for a "Fair Fight"

- Give the benefit of the doubt
- Assume good faith
- Focus on specific, concrete issues
- Do not accuse the person of malicious motives
- Seek to understand the perspective of the other person
- Remember that you are both on the same team, ultimately
- Don't interrupt
- Don't dominate the discussion
- Don't speak when your blood pressure is high! Calm down before speaking
- Breathe
- Don't try to resolve conflicts when you're hungry or tired or in a hurry
- Speak *to* the person, not *about* them
- Avoid demonizing the person (exaggerating their wickedness!)
- Avoid subtle jabs
- Avoid passive aggression ("silent treatment" "cold shoulder")
- Don't insult
- Don't generalize, "you always..."
- Don't interrupt
- Listen to the perspective of the other (repeating back their argument.)
- Use "I feel" rather than the more accusing, "you always..."
- Remember that there's more to the situation than meets your eye
- Try to imagine how they feel put yourself in their shoes
- Be self-aware recognize how your own feelings of tiredness, insecurity, or frustration may be exaggerating your reactions
- Use "save draft" before pushing the "send" button on an email
- Focus on the problem, not the person

"Business is business!" - the time-worn excuse for hypocrisy

Most of us compartmentalize our lives. We make a distinction between our "spiritual" life and our "professional" roles. Whether explicitly or implicitly, we often feel the need to leave our Christian values at church so we can "get ahead" in the office or shop or place of business.

A truly radical disciple erases this distinction between that which is "spiritual" and that which is "professional." He or she does everything – everything – in the name of Jesus.

2. We are called to work "in the name of Jesus"

What does it mean to do something "in the name of Jesus?"

2. Works with Integrity – No "double life"

So many excuses to compromise our integrity

- "Business is business, after all"
- "Everyone does it this way"
- "It's always been done this way"
- "I need the money"

It was no different in Jesus' day. Some professions were known for their lack of ethics, <i>especially soldiers and tax collectors</i> . These professions relied upon extortion to pad their salaries. Put simply, they used their position <i>to steal</i> from others.
Biblical Advice to Soldiers and Tax Collectors – Luke 3:12-14
¹² Even tax collectors came to be baptized. "Teacher," they asked, "what should we do?" "Don't collect any more than you are required to," he told them.
¹⁴ Then some soldiers asked him, "And what should we do?"
He replied, "Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely—be content with your pay."

Suddenly something amazing happens. Without touching a single key on his laptop, the printer on his desk begins to hum and beep, obviously processing some sort of transmission. Stunned, the student sees a sheet of paper begin to feed through the printer! In joyful awe, he grabs the sheet and begins to read the following words from God...

"My beloved child. I have heard your prayer. We will indeed spend much of time together – in summer school!"

If you want easy, instant results – go to McDonald's – not the Lord!

God wants prosperous children, but won't abide lazy ones!

4. Take Initiative – Follow the "internal captain"



The Persevering Christian...

- Starts strong; works hard; and finishes strong
- Gives 150%
- Sweats
- Concentrates
- Is not led by feelings
- Keeps on, in spite of tiredness or frustrations

Perseverance "walks the walk" as well as "talks the talk"
